Update from the Headteacher

Dear Parents & Carers,

I'm very pleased to be writing my first end of half term update to you and what a half term it's been! I hope the rest of this newsletter gives you a bit of a flavour as to what's been happening at Diss High in September and October in addition to the hundreds of timetabled lessons that take place every day.

I've been very grateful for the warm welcome from staff, students and parents that I've received as Diss High School's new Headteacher. I've shown several visitors around the school already and they have all commented on how polite our students are and what a productive learning atmosphere they've seen in classrooms. We are embedding our new mission statement of "work hard, be kind" – two qualities I'm sure everyone agrees are essential in trying to ensure that the young people of today go on to become successful, decent adults in the future.

As I said in my first letter to parents, we need to have a productive and mutually supportive relationship with the town of Diss and its surrounding villages. We want to engage fully with our local community, and to this end we now have a DHS Facebook page. Please search for Diss High School and the official page is the one with our DHS crest so you can keep up to date with our latest news.

Thank you for the nearly 300 responses we had to our recent parent survey. All of these were read carefully, and I'd like to give you some initial feedback on our actions following on from this. The vast majority of parents who responded were generally happy with how things are going but there were some areas identified as needing potential further improvement. The first is around knowing what work the students are doing. The curriculum maps on the website are a good first place for this information (https://www.disshigh.norfolk.sch.uk/home/learning/curriculum/) but if you have any further queries then just get in touch.

The second was about how we report to parents not always being that clear. To help with this we have introduced a new 'Attitude to Learning' grade on school reports which gives you information on something that parents usually care about above all else – i.e., how much your child is engaging with, and putting effort into, each lesson in that subject.

The third was probably the most pressing need. When asked to make a comment or suggestion on the last part of the survey most parents mentioned something to do with behaviour. As I mentioned in my previous letter, helping our students to understand what we mean by good learning behaviours is a key priority of ours. In common with many schools' post-lockdown, too much learning time was being lost last year due to non-compliance and disruptive behaviour and sanctions were not always applied consistently. It is early days, and we will need to remain vigilant, but students and staff are

reporting a much calmer atmosphere at the start of this term and our new 'C system' of structured warnings is helping to improve consistency. We also need to do more to celebrate the vast majority of our students who make the right choices day out, day in. By the time you read this our new 'positive shop' will have opened where students can trade in the positives they've gained for various items.

Of course, this isn't all we're working on, and it'd be good to give you updates on other school improvement priorities in future newsletters. One exciting development is our close association with Enrich Learning Trust which will become formal membership soon. It has been really useful to network with other school leaders across Norfolk to see how they are improving student outcomes. Every school has its own unique context, and this will always be true in Diss, but there are also many common challenges that we all face and where we can support and learn from each other we should.

I'd like to close by recalling a conversation I had with one of our Year 13s who started talking to me while I was doing bus duty last week – he asked if I was glad, I'd chosen to work at Diss. My answer to him was very much yes! Diss High School is a wonderful community. Of course, there are things to work on, as there would be in any school, but we have the raw ingredients here to have lots of successes in future years.

I hope you are able to take the time to look through this newsletter because there are so many students who have already achieved a lot this year and we celebrate them and all our other students who are working hard and being kind.








Hospitality and Catering news
